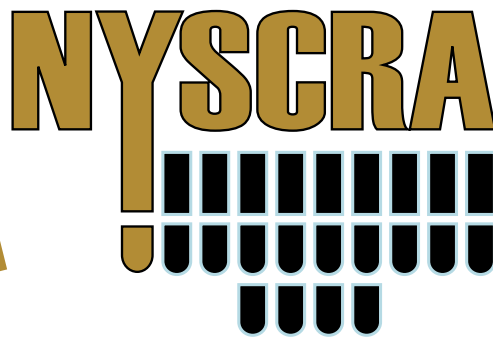

RCR (Realtime Court Reporter) TEST PREP

Participant will take practice tests, learn grading methodology for taking the NYSCRA NY Realtime Court Reporter Skills Exam. The objective is to make them aware of their dictionary conflict issues and how to clean out the dictionary and change their writing in order to pass this test.

Presenter: Harriet Brenner-Gettleman, CMRS, CRI

Spanning more than 50 years in the court reporting profession, as an official court reporter, freelancer and court reporting teacher, Harriet's career reflects a desire to help the industry move forward by embracing the technology that became available in the 1990s. Honing her skills in corporate management for several years, Harriet saw an urgent need for changes in the CR industry and opened a new kind of court reporting agency, one that addressed the need for highly technical computer-aided court reporting skills. She founded Realtime Reporting, Inc. and it opened for business in January 1998. As President of Realtime Reporting, Inc., Harriet was focused on cultivating relationships by knowing and understanding the needs of her clients and developing their trust, with the result of long-term relationships in the legal community. The company was named the best court reporting firm on Long Island for 2007 and 2008 by the Long Island Business News readership. In October of 2008, Harriet retired from the management position she held as President of Realtime Reporting, Inc. from 1998 to 2008. In the spirit of training the most skilled court reporters for the legal community, she had launched Realtime Center for Learning, Inc. in 2006, an unprecedented court reporting school, blending both in-house and distance learning

training in a self-paced curriculum so that graduates will have the basics to become realtime reporters, and/or CART providers or broadcast captioners. The commitment to the court reporting community is reflected in her service to the New York State Court Reporters Association where she served as President from 2012 to 2014 and is now serving in an advisory capacity on the President's Council.

RCR PERFORMANCE EXAMINATION

Test Administrator: Debra A. Levinson, CSR, RMR, CRR, CRI, NYRCR

Debra has been a court reporter in Metropolitan New York since 1974. An initial employment as hearing reporter with the NYS Department of Labor led to a career in freelancing. In 1992, she founded DALCO Reporting with offices in Westchester, Manhattan, and the Bronx. Attaining state and national credentials have always been her professional priority. She qualified in the NCRA realtime contest in 2012 and was recipient of the "Perfect Transcript" at the 2016 NYSCRA convention. Her committee appointments have included the NYS Board of Regents, National Court Reporters Association, and New York State Court Reporters Association. Debra now holds the position of CEO with DALCO and continues to advocate for graduate skills of working reporters.

THE HISTORY OF SHORTHAND {CEUs .1}

This lecture traces the history of the shorthand profession, from the creation of written literacy 5,000 years ago, to the invention of shorthand, through simultaneously producing text from speech in our own century. Historian Dom Tursi describes shorthand's 2,000-year contributions to society, and shares that its importance to the world has been largely taken for granted. The development of machine shorthand is explained, from earliest attempts, the first practical machines, and insight into why the first computerized steno machine was invented. Dom's presentation is peppered with factoids – some quite revealing - about some key inventors.

Presenter: Dominick M. Tursi, Past President; Director, The Gallery of Shorthand

Dom just entered his 56th year of reporting. For the past 20 years, he has reported in federal court on Long Island, New York. For the preceding 15 years, he was a freelance reporter and principal, with offices on both coasts of the United States, Hong Kong and in London, reporting assignments from Cairo to The Philippines.

For the 20 years before that, he was an official reporter in the New York State court system. One of the first East Coast reporters ever to use a computer for transcription, he wrote realtime as early as 1985. Dom is one of the first reporters to internationally telecommunicate steno, delivering 36 running days of daily copy in Hong Kong with no onsite assist – in 1988! Founder, director, and instructor at the Verbatim School of Court Reporting for more than a decade, Dom has served as an expert witness to reporting groups and law firms, a computer consultant to several companies, and was part of Stenograph's Case CATalyst and CaseView development teams. He has authored numerous monographs for NCRA, and for federal and state associations. He speaks to some 50 elementary and high school classes each year and has delivered his message about our professional heritage to reporting associations throughout America, in China, and in Belgium. He is past president of both the United States Court Reporters Association and the New York State Association, and is recipient of New York's distinguished service award. He is a Fellow of The Incorporated Phonographic Society of London, the world's oldest organization of shorthand writers, and in 2015 received the prestigious Santo J. Aurelio Award for Altruism from NCRF. His reporting credentials include being three-time NY State Shorthand Speed Contest Champion (Perfect Paper, 280 wpm Q&A), and World Shorthand Speed Champion (300 wpm Q&A, 5 minutes, 24 errors) in 1981 – a record that remains unbroken. He created two reporting think tanks to examine problems in the world of reporting, and recently launched The Cicero Forum – a program that teaches the practical aspects of the profession to new and novice reporters, giving them more practical working skills early in their career. In September 2010 Dom opened The Gallery of Shorthand in the lobby of the federal courthouse in which he works. It has received international recognition. And in 2015 he authored *The Legends of Shorthand* – a look at the pivotal people responsible for the evolution of our timeless profession.

Anissa Nierenberger has pursued her passion for captioning into three distinct areas; Anissa Captions, her proprietary software Dictionary Jumpstart, and training and education programs. Anissa discovered captioning when she was just 14 years old after spending a career day with a reporter in court. Determined to become a stenographer, she pursued her goal and within a year of graduation from court reporting school, she began captioning for TV stations across the United States and Canada. In 2000, Anissa founded Dictionary Jumpstart, a realtime dictionary-building software that has helped hundreds of reporters improve their dictionaries and allowed them to explore other areas of reporting, including captioning and CART captioning. As an author, Anissa has also published several articles as well as books that include the Drug Speller; Simple Syllables; A Jump Back in Time: People, Places and Events in History and most recently, Simpler Syllables: Let's Better Your Dictionary Together. Anissa is a past President of MAPCR (Michigan Association of Professional Court Reporters) and has been a member of NCRA (National Court Reporters Association) for over 25 years. She has presented seminars on realtime, captioning, dictionary building, and Dictionary Jumpstart to state and national associations, workshops.

HOW TO MENTOR {CEUs .05}

The New York State Court Reporters Association's Mentoring Program has seen some great growth over the last couple of years. It's gone from literally

nothing to having over 50 students signed in as well as over 30 NYSCRA members interacting with these students. What are the duties of both the Mentor and the Mentee? Obviously, the Mentors job is to "Mentor." What does that mean? The NYSCRA Mentors are professional Court Reporters and members of NYSCRA. Their jobs are multi-fold. They're not there to only listen, but also to guide, listen to the issues that a student has and to hopefully guide them towards success in not only their studies, but in their futures as Court Reporters. What are some of those types of topics? There are quite a number that may come up, but the most popular would have to do with studying, practicing, overcoming speeds, advice on the industry as a whole. Basically, the Mentor will be the students' guide along their path to success and sometimes just as someone who can be a sounding board. And then, of course, there's the Mentee a.k.a The Student. Your Mentors are highly motivated and successful people in this industry and their time is precious, not only for their own work schedules, but for all of their outside endeavors. We're here to help you. If you have questions, please ask them. There's no such thing as a stupid question, but keep in mind that these Mentors are truly volunteers. They want to help you, but they also don't want someone who's just going to complain about this or that. There's no perfect situation in this field or any other throughout the world, but we each have to deal with things in our own best way, but your Mentors are just like anyone else. Their time is precious, so if you have concerns or questions, ask them and your Mentors will do their best to help you. We were all once students so your Mentors understand your frustrations, your anxieties, whatnot. Help us by allowing us to help you.

Points on being a Mentor:

1. You need to be an NYSCRA paid member to be a Mentor.
2. Be patient with your student.
3. Be direct with your answers. Don't sugarcoat anything. Tell the student how things really are.
4. Offer concise, direct and appropriate opinions and suggests.

5. Let them have your office number and/or email address so that they feel like they can contact you for answers to their questions.

Presenter: Adam Alweis, RPR

ADAM H. ALWEIS, RPR, has been in the court reporting profession in one form or another his whole life. His family has a long history in the court reporting profession going all the way back to the 1940s, with 2 uncles, his father and oldest brother also in the profession. Adam started working as a Court Reporter in 1988 after spending two years at Alfred State College, and has continued working in the field for now over 30 years. His experience has ranged from both the freelance and official arenas. He has worked with various firms freelancing in the cities of Syracuse, New York; Rochester, New York; and West Palm Beach, Florida. After passing the New York State lower court examination in 1993, he began his career in the court system in Watertown, New York. Later, after passing the Supreme Court examination, his career took him to the Bronx Supreme Court in 1995 and then later in 1999 into Manhattan at both 100 Centre Street and then to 60 Centre Street. In 2007, he was approached and given the opportunity to return to his hometown of Syracuse and laterally transferred to the Onondaga County Combined Courts in the Fifth Judicial District where he remains to this day working in both the Supreme and County Courts which covers six different counties. Adam has served on various committees during his officialship in New York City as well as the New York State Court Reporters Association. He's been a member of both NYSCRA as well as NCRA for over 30 years. In addition, he served on the NYSCRA Board of Directors for many years and also served as its Vice President. In addition, Adam also serves currently on the Board of Directors of the Syracuse Jewish Federation as well as its Community Relations Committee. Along with having written numerous articles for NYSCRA and a couple for the National Court Reporters Association (NCRA) and the Association of Surrogates and Supreme Court Reporters Within the City of New York (ASSCR), Adam has also attended many political functions and conferences at state and national functions. He's hosted the Court and Captioning Week in Syracuse for 3 years. In addition, representing NYSCRA/ASSCR, at a press conference in 2015, he demonstrated the real-time capabilities of Court Reporters, which outlined the importance of CART and the legislation which eventually passed through the New York State Legislature, also commonly known as the CART Bill. Recently, he was a co-host of a Court Reporting booth at the New York State School Counselors Association (NYSSCA) in Syracuse, New York, and instructed and displayed to high school guidance counselors and school teachers the Court Reporting Industry and Real-Time and recommended their adding the CR profession into their listings of future professions for their students. In February of 2018, he attended a Job Fair at a local BOCES (Board of Cooperative Educational Services) facility in New Hartford, New York, and again promoted the Court Reporting profession to young students. In addition, Adam has also not only provided free dictation material

to numerous court reporting schools over the years, but also recreated NYSCRA's mentoring program which has increased its participants with over 50 students and over 30 mentors. On top of that, Adam created NYSCRA's Facebook page over 9 years ago in order to establish a continuous form of communication of not only the NYSCRA membership, but as a tool of gathering up-to-date information from all over the world regarding the court reporting profession, up to date articles on the subject as well as promoting new job opportunities. As of June of 2018, there are over 1,250 people signed into this Facebook page. In his spare time, he enjoys spending time with his family and friends.

TEACHERS WORKSHOP {CEUs .25}

This seminar will focus on teaching Court Reporters how to dictate at various speeds using a stopwatch. They will practice enunciating and projecting their voices while dictating and timing using the stopwatch for several speeds. We will focus on techniques of voice recognition to differentiate the Q&A testimony including 3-voice. They will learn how to mark material in 20-word count and to indicate timings for each speed and understanding the difference between word count and syllabic count. Practice material will be distributed for hands-on application of marking and how to mark Q&A, Jury Charge and Literary dictations. The objective is to train members/ attendees to help with future test prep classes, A to Z programs that may be given throughout the state, and give them the ability to obtain teaching positions in Court Reporting schools because NY CR schools are experiencing a shortage of teachers.
