

WHAT IS AN ERROR?

1. WRONG WORDS

Each wrong word

(D): I didn't see the car until we hit. (T): I didn't notice any vehicle until we hit. (3 errors)

Note: Each wrong and/or substituted word counts as only one error not two.

Plural read as singular and vice versa

(D): Let me check the <u>dates</u>.

(T): Let me check the <u>date</u>. (1 error)

Present-tense verb read as past tense and vice versa

(D): In other words, you <u>acted</u> as a clerk.

(T): In other words, you <u>act</u> as a clerk. (1 error)

2. OMITTED WORDS

Each omitted word

(D): I drove and he slept.

(T): I drove. He slept. (1 error)

3. ADDED WORDS

Each added word

(D): Yes.

(T): Yes, <u>sir</u>. (1 error)

4. TRANSPOSED WORDS

Each transposed word

Note: If one or more words are transposed from one part of the sentence to another, then each transposed word is an error.

(D): Then when he started

(T): When he then started. (1 error)

(D): Before I went to Chicago, <u>I went</u>

(T): <u>I went home</u> before I went to Chicago. (3 errors)

5. MISSPELLED WORDS

Misspelled words (including typographical errors)

(D): hospital

(T): hotpital (1 error)

(D): That <u>doctor</u> is not my <u>doctor</u>. (T): That <u>docter</u> is not my <u>docter</u>. (2

errors)

6. WRONG NAMES

Each wrong name

(D): Mr. <u>Smith</u> followed me home. (T): Mr. <u>Jones</u> followed me home. (1

error)

7. PERIODS AND COMMAS

Omitted periods or commas that are required by the rules of punctuation

(D): I could<u>n't. I</u> was asleep.

(T): I could<u>n't I</u> was asleep. (1 error)

(D): It results from a misinterpretation of several cases which Brown cites. In Grant v.

<u>United the</u> point was made.

(T): It results from a misinterpretation of several cases which Brown cites in Grant v. United. The point was made. (1

error)

(D): September 20, 1993, will be the first day of classes.

(T): September 20 1993, will be the first day of classes. (1 error)

8. QUESTION MARKS

Question marks omitted from interrogatory sentences

(D): Q. What is your name?

(T): Q. What is your name. (1 error)

9. CONTRACTIONS

Contractions transcribed as two words and vice versa

(D): I don't know.

(T): I <u>do not</u> know. (1 error)

10. Q AND A

Omission of Q and A

(D): A. Do you mean now? O. Yes.

(T): A. Do you mean now? Yes. (1 error)

(D): A. Do you mean now?

Q. Yes. That is right.

(T): A. Do you mean now? That is right. (3 errors)

Note: One error for omitted Q; one error for omitted Yes; one error omitted A.

11. INCORRECT NUMBERS OR MONEY FIGURES

Incorrect number or money figure represented by a word

(D): May one, nineteen fifty one.

(T): May 1, <u>1815</u> (3 errors rather than 1)

(T): May <u>22, 1815</u> (4 errors)

12. CAPITALS

Omitted proper name - capital letter (T): cleveland, Ohio (1 error)

13. ACRONYMS

Words in place of an acronym and vice versa

(D): CIA

(T): <u>Central Intelligence Agency</u> (3 errors)

(D): I have worked for the <u>FBI</u> for three years.

(T): I have worked for the <u>CIA</u> for three years. (3 errors)

14. COMPOUND WORDS

Compound word incorrectly written

(D): The high school <u>dropout</u> rate has increased the last two years.

(T): The high school <u>drop out</u> rate has increased the last two years. (1 error)

THESE WILL NOT BE COUNTED AS ERRORS:

- Use of the word "dollars" instead of the \$ symbol
- Use of the word "percent" instead of the % sign
- Omitted sets of quotation marks or parentheses

Note: If an opening quote or parenthesis is used, a closing quote or parenthesis must also be used.

- A word that does not translate but forms the correct English word
 Note: Translation may be in brackets): (D): Hub (T): (HUB)
- Misplaced commas (except listed in #7)
- Optional capitalization of certain words (e.g. President, State, Jury)
- In dates, ordinal numbers for cardinal numbers and vice versa: either May 1 or May 1st; May 22 or May 22nd
- Punctuation which was part of a drop
- Missing hyphens
- Placing "The Court:" at the beginning of the Jury Charge test
- Ms. or Miss (D: Ms. Smith; T: Miss Smith); Mrs. is an error
- Including or excluding the "BY" line
